
CHAPTER ONE

The geographical entity known as Nasarawa State came into xistence on the 1st of October 1996. It has a central location in the niddle belt region of Nigeria. The state lies between latitude 7° 45' and 9° 5'N of the equator and between longitude 7° and 9° 37'E of the freenwich meridian. It shares boundary with Kaduna state in the north, lateau state in the east, Taraba and Benue states in the south, while Kogi nd the Federal Capital Territory flank it in the west (Binbol and Marcus, 005). Nasarawa state fondly called "Home of Solid Minerals" has an littude of 181.5m above sea level (a.s.l).

Located in the north-central geo-political zone of Nigeria, the state has a and area of 27,137.8 square kilometers with a population of 1,863,275 ccording to 2006 provisional census. It has 13 Local Government treas (Figure 1.1).
